Teacher Feature: Ric Mendoza of Honoka'a High & Intermediate

What do high school crushes have in common with business strategies? Quite a bit, as it turns out, in Ric Mendoza's classroom at Honoka'a High and Intermediate School. He recently asked students how they might apply business concepts to gain their crush's interest. Other unconventional approaches include a de-emphasis on homework to set students up for healthy work-life balances in their future careers, and drawing on his own business experience to help students see futures for themselves as entrepreneurs and leaders. Mendoza's program -- the Dragon Den internship -- is created in partnership with Kō Education Center and provides professional skills education, on-the-job experience with real clients, and monetary incentives. Next up, Mendoza is launching a chapter of DECA (Distributive Education Clubs of America) at the school to impact more students and inspire them to business pathways.
